COMMODORE COMMUNIQUE

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What better place is there to spend a summer weekend than at Pevensey Bay SC?! What a cracking weekend and probably the first real summer's weather of the year. Recently we have had to put up with a string of easterly winds, creating difficult launching conditions and a choppy sea, but this last weekend has really made up for it. Conditions for all the activities we offer, topped off by a healthy sea breeze today (Sunday) creating "champagne" sailing conditions. At last!!!

I hope that you are making good use of the Club as the sea warms up and the weather improves. There are clearly a good number of members who have not even put their boats together yet and I wonder, if you don't come sailing now, when will you?? With the Sailing Camp coming up in a few days, followed shortly afterwards by Seaweeek (mentioned later in this Aquila) there are plenty of opportunities to get involved.

We are lucky to be able to offer camping space on the green and space for caravans and motor homes to park around our premises, but it has taken many years to achieve a site which has the many uses that we put it to. It continues to take a lot of time and effort to keep it in this usable state. Please look after it and avoid damaging the grass, shrubs and trees.

You will notice that recently the front edge of the green is showing signs of wear and so please avoid activities that will damage this area further and remember that we do not allow vehicles and caravans on the grass.

Recently the ExCom discussed the charges for camping / caravanning and has issued the following statement.

The committee agreed that camping would be free of charge for two nights at weekends i.e. Fri/Sat. Thereafter there will be a charge of £5 for caravans/ motorhomes /tents per additional night with a maximum lengths stay of 1 week (which can include 2 weekends).

The camping charge for Seaweeek will be £25.



EGM - SPECIAL RESOLUTION.

Thank you to those who attended the Club on a not so pleasant summer's afternoon and expressed their views and had their votes recorded. The proposal was passed by the majority of those attending and so we thank you for supporting the committee. For those who have missed all this! It simply means that the ExCom can invite the Commodore to stay in post for one further year, after doing the normal two years. This then has to be passed at an AGM as usual, with all the Executive Committee standing

down and having to be re-elected by the whole membership. This is not a take-over bid but a tool to help the committee, in difficult circumstances, if need arises.

On a personal note, I have stated that I would be willing to stand again if necessary, but don't particularly want to. I will only do this if all the other posts on the Committee are filled and there is clear succession for the posts of Commodore and Vice Commodore.

must have tide tables on board and Balers..!!!! Hey ho), nothing new there, the auditor has to prove his worth. So well done James, Sterling effort from one who has been there!

Part of Safety Boat helm and OOD duty is to confirm tide status, weather (WX) prior to launching, so why have a soggy tide table book in the RIB! If a RIB has an A frame it must have a radar reflector.... we don't go out in the dark or fog.....but we comply.

Likewise a big thank you to Justin Pollard our Sailing Secretary for over seeing the Personal Handicaps racing, normal racing and ensuring everything runs smoothly. Much goes on in the daily background that most of us don't see.

Now the small whinge!..... Had to have one, well actually two, OK maybe three..... the grass area of the club is for sail training, games as appropriate, camping with tents and boat bimbly ONLY, no caravans or campervans to be parked on the grass area. These should be located on the hard standing of the car park area, and if desired, any associated Awning can be pegged onto the grass area adjacent to the hard standing, as per tents.

And..... please note that we have placed two parking cones on the seaward club side of the grass area, please DO NOT PARK in between the cones, we have had instances where dinghies cannot be moved onto/off the grass without damaging members vehicles, if at all. Thank you.... you know it makes sense!

Final whinge, if you borrow any tools or equipment out of the Boat House, and we all do at some point, please return from where you found aforesaid item, or please advise Ken Brookes, Bosun, so that he can amend as required.

Work to repair the automatic race computer has been completed with Matt Fowler manufacturing an excellent manual switch box to support the automatic system. We have also obtained a Count Down/Count Up clock to go with the switch box, again it's really easy to use so sign up for some OOD or time keeping duties and give it a try.

While I mention duties, at the beginning of the year we asked everyone to volunteer and sign up for at least two duties. The take up has been quite slow in some

cases so the Duties Officer has had to allocate duties to fill the gaps. The club house and beach are open throughout the week and members arrange a wide array of on and off water activities.

Many members camp on the field which creates a great festival atmosphere with the PBSC village appearing from the Thursday before until the Sunday after Sea Week.

There's something for everyone and planning for Sea Week 2022 is well under way and set to be another action-packed week. The event is now live on the club's Facebook page so please check in there for the latest updates.

If you would like to attend Sea Week then please fill in the google form in the following link to give details stating how many people will be attending in your party and if you would like to purchase a meal deal ticket.

Everyone chips in on chores to ensure the bar remains stocked, safety boats are safe and the club house and green are kept orderly. You'll be asked to sign up for some of these duties when booking. 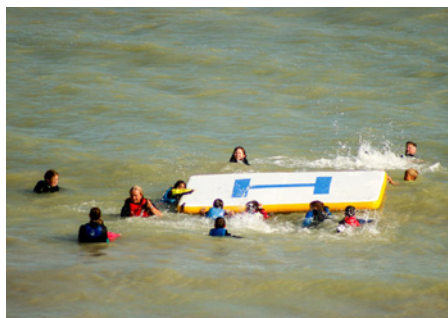
