Of course we have had the hardy, hard core sailors who will sail in any conditions, sailing most weeks. We have run racing most weekends, with small fleets, but I expect most of you are waiting for the weather to warm up.

A couple of weeks ago we had what we have classified as a "Near Miss" on the beach after sailing. As the big safety boat was being winched up the steep part of the beach the winch in the boathouse jumped out of gear, allowing the heavily laden boat to run backwards down the beach.

Fortunately no one was directly behind the boat, but Adrian needed to show his athletic prowess, by leaping out of the way, narrowly avoiding being run over. The beach really is our danger zone and I am sure that we have had far more injuries of people stood firmly on the beach, than out at sea.

So please be warned;

- Do not walk or stand behind any safety boat while it is being winched up the beach.
- When pulling the boats down the beach, stay outside the ropes and avoid getting in front of the boat.
- Always ensure the winch cable is attached to the trailer when moving the large boats down the beach.
- Only use the low gear on the big winch and do not change gear while in use.

We are in the process of upgrading the big winch in the boathouse which should create a more user friend, safer and efficient system.

Inspired by our very own Round Britain hero (lunatic?) Neil Peters (alias Stick Daring) we were visited by another sailor aiming to sail solo, unsupported, around the British Isle in a Laser. What is it with these guvs? At least have a boat with a bed in it with a few home comforts!! Anyway Andrew Hill-Smith set off on his voyage a week or so ago and landed at the Club on the 16th April for an overnight stop. I am pleased to say that Andrew was delighted with the warm reception and help he received when he beached his boat so thanks to all involved.

We are gearing up for the Federation Meeting and behind the scenes

arranging a meeting with the Federation Clubs to discuss the event. For those not aware the Federation Clubs along the South Coast going from West to East (the prevailing wind direction) are, Newhaven and Seaford, Eastbourne & Sovereign, ourselves, Bexhill, Hastings & St Leonards, and Rye Harbour Sailing Club. We are trying to get as many competitors from our own and other clubs as possible to make this a big weekend event with the Junior Federation on the Saturday 1st July followed by the Federation on the Sunday. 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#### House

Despite a lot of poor weather since the last Aquila, work has continued on various tasks around the club.

The planting project (led very successfully by Sarah Pullen) has almost been completed – all that now remains is to plant a further five trees (already purchased) along the Fast fence when the weather allows.

The cladding of the container roofs has progressed, with the cladding

panels having been installed on the container adjacent to the East fence and timber framework for the cladding having been completed on the second container. Dave Vercoe has finished installing light and power to the 'House' container and work will shortly start on fitting it out with shelving etc.

The clubhouse external walls have been painted and the grounds generally tidied up.

Now that the sailing season has started, it is likely that work on the various house tasks around the club will be undertaken during the week, rather than via working parties.

### **Boat park**

We have now completed the installation of the boat space markers and painting the space numbers on them (thanks John!). In the process a number of new spaces have been created by extending Row Z along the back fence — although these are now full with the boats of new members!

Over the last two or three months I have been asking members (via email, our website, Facebook and

Aguila) with trailers at the back of the park to ensure that their trailers are clearly and indelibly marked with the owners name(s), preferably with paint or an embossed label. This was to be done by the end of March 2023, at which point any trailers not marked with the owners name(s) would be moved to the East fence and subject to the abandoned trollies process. Be aware that, where I put white labels with bearing the owners name on some trailers last year, in some cases the names have weathered away, so the trailer cannot be identified to an owner.

As of today (Saturday 15th April) about half of the trailers still have no owner's names on them, so I have started moving them to the East fence. The club got a reasonable amount of money from the sale/scrapping of unclaimed trailers last year, so PLEASE MAKE SURE THAT YOUR TRAILER IS CLEARLY AND INDELIBLY MARKED WITH YOUR NAME(S).

# PLANTING PROJECT

The planting of the East boundary is now completed. We have a few pine trees of varying size and type planted along the East boundary and will see which ones do best on the site, introducing others at a later date. You might wonder why they are not staked up to the hilt, but the advice has been, 2ft down, and less is more (staking). They will have the summer to get their roots established before facing the challenge of next winter's gales. These are in addition to the holm oaks and shrubs already planted.

On the wild side, there is a colony of tiny blue grape hyacinths flowering now and thriving at the further end of the East boundary. I am not sure whether these are special ones which have been planted intentionally, but been stunted by the growing conditions, or wild ones, which seems less likely as they are rare. I didn't know there was a wild grape hyacinth until I looked it up this week, and they are found on the East coast. Are there any botanists around who could tell us?

Wild or not, we need to take care underfoot with trees, plants and flowers growing around the site, and are lucky to have some plants specific to our coastal site. All need protecting.
